FIRST TIME EXHIBITORS

We are thrilled that you are interested in exhibiting at the Price County Fair. If this is your first time exhibiting, please read through the following and reach out if you have any questions.

1. Look through the Fair Premium Book to classify the item or items you wish to exhibit. For example, you think the cucumbers you planted in your garden should be really nice by the time of the fair or you took some photos you'd like to enter.
2. Determine the Department of the item, which in the case of cucumbers would be Dept. 114 – Plants and Soil Sciences in the Open Class section of the Premium. Remember that only 4-H members, scouts & youth organizations can exhibit under the Junior Division section of the premium book, all others must use Open Class.
3. Now determine the Class of the item – in the case of the cucumbers, it would be Class A – Vegetables Class, Plate Exhibit.
4. Next determine the Lot of the item – cucumbers would be any of lots 16 or 17 depending on the type of cucumbers that you planted. Let's say that the ones you planted are the regular ones that we purchase in the stores, so they would be Lot 17 – Cucumbers for slicing. If you look at the number right after the words Cucumbers for slicing, you will notice there is a number 6; that is the number of cucumbers you would need for your exhibit.
5. Continue looking through the Fair Premium Book and making a list of all things you'd like to enter.
6. When you are ready, go to <http://PriceCountyFair.fairentry.com> or <http://www.fairentry.com> then "Find your Fair" & search "Price". Directions for entering your Fair Entries can be found on pages 5 and 6.
7. If you do not have a computer and/or are unable to use Fair Entry, please reach out to the Price County Fair Secretary/Treasurer at 608-387-2670 and they will help you get everything entered.
8. On page 4 you will find the fees noted for each exhibitor type. (The numbers that are listed above the items you are exhibiting are for the premiums that you would receive if you are awarded a first, second, third or fourth place for your exhibit.) If you wish to purchase a season pass or need a stall for animals, the fees are listed and your payment should be included with the Exhibitor Fee, which can be paid on-line through Fair Entry and/or sent to the Price County Fair Association, INC, P.O. Box 123, Phillips, WI 54555.
9. Entry tags will be available Monday of Fair Week at the Price County Fair Office from 10am until Entry Day. All entries should be brought on Entry Day, which is Wednesday of the Fair Week, to the fairgrounds between 3:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m.
10. After you obtain your tags, please secure the tag to the item and take your item or items to the check-in table, where volunteers will help you check all items in. You will then take the items to the appropriate Department, identified by signs. The top part of the tag is attached to the entries and the bottom part of the tag you keep to claim your item at Exhibit Release on Sunday. If you happen to enter baked goods, please be sure to enclose your items in plastic bags before you bring them from home for sanitary purposes!
11. Now all you have to do is work on your entries and wait for judging. Should you be awarded placing, let's say your cucumbers received a second place from the judge, you would receive a red ribbon or second place sticker and sometime after the Fair, you would receive a premium check. If you look back at the premium book under the Class section you will see a set of 4 numbers indicating the premiums that will be paid for each placement of your items, should you receive anything from the judge from first to fourth place.

Fair Entry

- Final Day to Submit Fair Entries: **3rd Monday of July**. Be sure to complete your entry (including the final “Submit” step) prior to the cut-off date.
- ALL FEE Payments are due on Fair Entry or received by the Fair Secretary/Treasurer no later than Final Submit Date: 3rd Monday of July. Any exhibits without paid fees may be scratched.
- Register all entries for each exhibitor in the family before proceeding to the Payment Section.
- Be sure to click the “Submit” button when you have completed your entries. Entries are not final until they have been submitted approved.
- Recommended browsers: Google Chrome or Mozilla Firefox. Older versions of Internet Explorer may cause unexpected results.
- Verify ALL demographic information including email, mailing address & phone numbers prior to submitting entries.
- Check your email inbox and spam for a confirmation email with a list of your entries & any related fees.
- You will receive a second email when your entries have been approved by the fair, not instantly.

To get started...

1. Go to <http://PriceCountyFair.fairentry.com> or <http://www.fairentry.com> then “Find your Fair” & search “Price”
2. All 4-H Youth must register using their family’s 4H Online Account. Do not create an account with Fair Entry! ***FYI – You can add Open Class entries for the rest of your family, in the family account once you enter through 4H Online.

If you don’t remember your 4H Online Password, request a new one through 4H Online. Follow these steps:

- i. Go to <http://WI.4honline.com>.
 - ii. Enter the email address that is associated with your 4HOnline account & select the Forgot Password option.
 - iii. After receiving a temporary password, go to <http://WI.4honline.com> to sign in with the email address & temporary password.
 - iv. The system will ask to set a new permanent password.
 - v. After the permanent password is set, go to Fair Entry website.
3. NON 4-H/OPEN CLASS First time users - Click on the link to “create a Fair Entry Account.”
 - a. Enter your email address twice & click Create Account. IMPORTANT: This must be a valid email address, so that you can receive the necessary confirmation messages.
 - b. On the Account Creation page, enter information into the fields (ALL are required). Account Name, Phone, Password (enter twice to confirm). Click Create Account.
 4. NON 4-H/OPEN CLASS Logging back in - Enter the email & password that you created & click “Sign In”
 5. Click “Begin Registration”
 - a. 4-Hers will be listed & other family members will need to create an account by clicking “Register an Exhibitor”.
 - b. If not listed, register as an “Individual.” Enter all information into the fields, all are required. When all information is correct Click Continue to Entries.
 - c. All questions (type of exhibitor, season passes, camping, premises #, etc) for registration must be completed for all family members (exhibitors).

Creating Entries:

1. Each exhibitor can have multiple entries. One entry must be made for each item, animal, class, etc. For example, if an exhibitor is bringing two photographs, two entries into the Photography Class must be created. If an exhibitor is showing one horse in five events, five class entries must be created. Once all entries have been created for the first exhibitor, you have the choice of creating another exhibitor in this family (& entries) or proceeding to check-out (submitting the entries) ****CLUB ENTRIES: To make a "club" entry-Leaders should enter the "club" as an exhibitor under their accounts. Put the name of the club as the first/last name (if 4H, use "4-H Club" as the last name). Then make the entries for the club under that "exhibitor."
2. Click "Add an Entry" beside the correct exhibitor (if more than one has been created).
3. Click "Select" beside the first department you wish to enter. Any departments that are not available for entry will be noted as "Not Available" with a short explanation.
4. After you select a department, you will see a list of divisions to select from, & then a list of available classes. Also notice that there are blue "Change" links in case you mistakenly select an incorrect department, division, or class.
5. If this is an animal class entry, you may be required to specify which animal will be exhibited in this class; that may be optional; or you may NOT be able to specify the animal at entry time. If you can, you will see the option to "Add an animal."
6. Fill in all the fields with information about the animal you intend to exhibit. Click "Create & Add Animal" when finished.
7. If the animal information was entered incorrectly, you have the option to either Remove from Entry (creating a new animal) or Edit Animal Details. When it is correct, click "Continue".
8. Any questions or file uploads related to entry in this class will be next. Click "Continue" after answering those questions or uploading documents. We do realize some required documents will not be available right away. In that case, please upload a stand-in document that states "document will be uploaded when available".
9. The Review screen allows you to double check this entry for accuracy & make any changes necessary. When the information is correct, click "Continue" & that class entry is complete.
10. When each class entry is complete, you have 3 choices for what to do next:
 - a. If all class entries have been completed for one exhibitor, you can Register another Exhibitor in this family.
 - b. If this exhibitor has more class entries to make, you can Add another Entry for this Exhibitor.
 - c. If all entries for all exhibitors in the family have been completed, Continue to Payment to finalize, & submit your entries.
11. Review your entries for completeness & accuracy. *Notice the Summary & Detail buttons at the top of the list on the right. If there are errors, click on the green Entries section at the top of the page.*
12. Click "Continue" when all information is correct.
13. Read the payment instructions & select your method of payment. NOTE: all entries require payment.
14. You must click "Continue" to the last "Confirm" step to submit your entries.
15. Read the information in the "After you Submit" section. You may also have to check a box to "Agree to Terms."
16. Click "Submit" to finalize the entries for all the exhibitors in this family. ****After you click "Submit", no changes are possible to these entries until they are approved or denied.

NOTICE TO EXHIBITORS

All residents of Wisconsin are eligible to enter any of the exhibits in this premium list, providing they meet the requirements of the department. Entries can be completed online at:

<http://www.fairentry.com> then “Find your Fair” & search “Price”

1. Each Exhibitor will be allowed one entry in a lot under his/her Entry Number.
2. All exhibits must conform to the Premium List. Read the requirements of the exhibit carefully before making the entry. Premiums on exhibits that are not listed in this premium book will not be paid.
3. All exhibits must be entered in the name of the owner and must be the result of his/her own work. The work must not have been exhibited previously. Exception: Livestock and Antiques.
4. Wednesday, opening day of the fair shall be known as “Entry Day.” **Exhibits will be received at the fairgrounds from 3:00 p.m. until 7:00 p.m. on that day.** Flowers and Houseplants **MUST BE** brought in 3-7pm on Entry Day. Face to Face Exhibits should be brought in on the appointed day.
5. Fair Entry is the preferred method of entering exhibits in the Price County Fair. Should you need to fill out the entry form for submission, the entry forms must be postmarked or received by the Price County Fair Association – P.O. Box 123 – Phillips, WI. 54555 no later than **the third Monday of July. NO ENTRIES MAY BE ACCEPTED AFTER THAT DATE.**
6. **Season Passes are available to be ordered through Fair Entry. Entry Tags and Season Passes will be available Monday of Fair Week at the Fair Office from 10am until ENTRY DAY.**
7. Attach entry tags securely to the exhibit and bring to the Registration Table to be checked-in on Entry Day. Please follow exhibit instructions as listed by each department.
8. **All animals must remain in place until the Fair Board designates on Sunday after the fair. All other exhibits must remain in place until 9:00 A.M. Sunday after the fair. Exhibits may be removed until 2:00 P.M. on the Sunday after the fair.** Please make arrangement with the Fair Secretary for any exhibits left after that time. The Association will dispose of articles left for which no special arrangements have been made.
9. All judging will be done by State Accredited Judges. Judging will be open to the public and will follow a schedule published by the Association. We urge you to attend the judging of all exhibits. Exhibitors of animals will be notified about the schedule for showing these exhibits. All exhibitors of livestock, poultry and rabbits **MUST BE PRESENT** to handle and show their animals.
10. Fair Association Members are responsible for Exhibits and have full authority regarding judging, exhibit displays, and exhibit release. All complaints should be referred to them.
11. Season passes are available for purchase through Fair Entry or directly from the Fair Secretary until Wednesday evening of Fair Week.
12. All fees are due by the Entry Deadline and are **NON-REFUNDABLE.**
13. All exhibitors of livestock shall be responsible for feeding, watering, cleaning, and supervision of their exhibits at the fairgrounds. Morning chores are expected to be completed no later than 8:30 a.m. every day. They must keep their stalls clean and the barn isles clean at all times.
14. Any animal exhibiting unruly or unsafe behavior will be asked to leave the fairgrounds at the owners’ expense. They will not be eligible for any premium or prizes. This will be at the discretion of the Price County Fair Association Inc. Exhibitors must keep their stalls open and the stock uncovered from 8:30 A.M. to 10:00 P.M. during each day of the fair. Any animal that is not properly groomed, or is in an unclean condition shall not be awarded

first place; regardless of its merits, but will get a lower award or may be barred entirely.

15. After the fair, on Sunday morning, all pens/stalls/buildings will be cleaned and presented to Price County Productions in the same or better condition as to when fair week began. If pens/stalls and all other areas are not cleaned out after the fair, NO premiums will be awarded. EVERYONE helping will make it go a lot faster on Sunday after the Fair.

16. Exhibitors wishing to stay on the grounds must register/coordinate with the Fair Office and must agree to abide by the rules as set by the Price County Fair Assoc. Inc. Failure to comply with the rules will result in expulsion from the fairgrounds. There are limited spaces and will be granted access on a first-come-basis. Reserving a camping spot is available through Fair Entry.

17. Any person or party who shall make a fraudulent entry in any article or animal for competition, or who shall violate any of the rules or

regulations of said Association in any manner, with intent to defraud said Association shall forfeit all premiums that shall be awarded to such person.

18. While security will be on the grounds day and night to preserve order and property, the Price County Fair Association, Inc. cannot be responsible for any articles that might be lost, stolen or damaged.

19. Complaints must be referred to the Fair Secretary, or any member of the Board of Directors within 10 days after the close of the fair.

20. Any questions should be directed to a member of the Board of Directors, the Fair Secretary or the Fair Advisors.

21. Junior Division Exhibitors who are unable to be present for “Face to Face” Judging due to college or technical school commitments may arrange to have their entries brought by another person for judging. They must contact the Fair Secretary prior to judging day to arrange this.

Wisconsin Administrative Rule

– Chapter ATCP 160

Subchapter I —

General Requirements and Definitions

ATCP 160.01 Definitions. As used in this chapter:

- (1) “Breed class” and “breeding class” mean a specific breed within a class such as Holstein in the dairy class.
- (2) “Class” means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.
- (2m) “Conference judging” means a judging system using a discussion about each exhibit with the entire group.
- (3) “Danish judging system” means a judging system that allows for multiple first, second, third and fourth class selections as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (b).
- (4) “Department” as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, “department” means the state of Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection.
- (5) “Division” means one of 3 exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division.
- (6) “Entry class” means a class in which the fair allows exhibitors to submit entries.
- (7) “Exotic domestic animal” means an animal that is not a common farm animal.
- (7e) “Face-to-Face Judging” means a judging system using a semiprivate discussion between the judge and the exhibitor with the following phases:
 - (a) Get acquainted.
 - (b) Learn the background of the exhibit.
 - (c) Self-evaluation.

(d) Evaluator comment.

(e) Parting.

(7m) “Fair” means a county or district fair eligible to receive state aid under s. 93.23 (1) (b) or (c), Stats.

(7s) “Fair Board” means the governing entity of a Fair.

(8) “Lot” or “lot number” means the numerical designation assigned by a fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.

(9) “Market class” means a class that includes animals of a certain weight for the species that can be sold for slaughter.

(10) “Premium” means a monetary prize that a fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.

(11) “Regular judging system” means a judging system that allows for one first, second, third and fourth class selection as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (c).

(12) “Self-Determined Project” means a project that meets all of the following criteria:

(a) It is approved by the fair board.

(b) Its subject matter is related to any of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, or 20 to 29.

(c) It does not fall into a defined entry class within any department.

(d) It is carried out by a member of a youth organization.

(13) “Youth organization” means an organization under adult leadership that has educational programing.

ATCP 160.02 Premium Requirements.

(1) GENERAL.

(a) The state aid authorized by s. 93.23 (1), Stats., may be paid on net premiums paid by a fair. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair that does not enforce animal health provisions under ch. ATCP 10 that are applicable to animals exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.

(b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify actions taken by a fair.

(c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason.

(e) No fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class.

(f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.

(2) PREMIUM LISTS.

(a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (c).

(b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.

(c) Sections ATCP 160.01 through 160.07 and 160.91 shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested.

(3) ENTRY FEES.

(a) A fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee or charge stall rents for animals, or both.

(b) Exhibitors in department 35 shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor’s ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor’s season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor’s season ticket.

(4) SPLIT FAIR DATES.

(a) For purposes of this subsection, “split fair dates” occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year.

(b) Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split dates based on hardship.

(c) The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates with advance notification to the department:

1. Clothing revue.
2. Demonstrations.
3. Favorite foods revue.
4. Dogs.
- 4m. Cats.
5. Small animals.
6. Rocketry.
7. Shooting sports.
- 7m. Mechanical projects.
8. Other exhibits and contests that are similar to those identified in subds. 1. to 7.

(d) If there are split dates under par. (b) or (c), all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit.

ATCP 160.03 Exhibition requirements. A fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

- (1) No fair society or other organization sponsoring a fair may require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor may the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society.
- (2) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.
- (3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02 (4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.49 (7).
- (4) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds before 4 p.m. on the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animal on the ground.

ATCP 160.05 Open division; general requirements.

- (1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into multiple premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for the last place in the class.
- (2) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.
- (3) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.
- (4) State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in open class division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal.
- (5) The fair board may establish specific classes by professional and amateur level groupings within classes for open class departments 14 to 28.

ATCP 160.07 Classes; general requirements.

- (1) Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.
- (2)
- (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered. Registered status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration.
- (b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.
- (3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.
- (4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.
- (5) The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair.

ATCP 160.39 Senior citizens division; general requirements.

- (1) The age of exhibitors in the senior citizens division is limited to persons 62 years of age or over.
- (2) Exhibitors in the senior citizens division may not enter identical items or articles in both the senior citizens division and the corresponding classes of the regular open division.
- (3) State aid may not be used to award more than one premium to an exhibitor in a premium or lot number in the senior citizens division.
- (4) State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item that has been exhibited in the senior citizens division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item.

ATCP 160.49 Junior fair division; general.

- (1) In the junior fair division, the department may pay state aid on prizes offered to exhibitors who are ages 8 to 20 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year and exhibitors who are 5 to 9 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year who are exhibiting under s. ATCP 160.65. A fair board may establish specific entry classes within each department. A fair board may establish subgroups within a junior fair entry class based on the exhibitor's age or grade in school. The department may not pay state aid on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or a project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.
- (2) All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be members of a youth organization approved by the fair board.
- (3) Exhibits in the junior fair shall be the product of the exhibitor's own labor. An exhibit may include a study project, merit project or other special project, a skill area, or a supervised occupational experience in which the exhibitor is regularly enrolled, provided that the fair board approves the project, skill area, or supervised occupational experience as an exhibit.
- (4) State aid may not be used to award more than one premium to an exhibitor in a premium or lot number in the junior fair division, except for any of the following:
 - (a) A premium may be awarded to each member of a group that collectively owns and enters a livestock exhibit in departments one to 5 of subch. IV.
 - (b) An exhibitor may receive a separate premium for showmanship where authorized under subch. IV.
 - (c) An exhibitor may receive more than one premium in a department for which additional premiums are specifically authorized under subch. IV.
- (5) State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in the junior division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal.

ATCP 160.91 Judging regulations.

(1) Judging shall be done at fairs by individuals who are registered with the department. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.

(1m)

(a) An individual shall register by submitting to the department an application. The department shall register all individuals who qualify to be judges, including having the knowledge, training, or experience in the specific classes to be judged and adhering to ethical judging practices. The registration is valid for five years.

(b) An individual submitting an application after July 1 may not judge for the current fair year.

(c) A fair representative may request the department waive par. (b) in cases of unanticipated emergency situations.

(2) Each judge at a fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.

(3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.

(4)

(a) Danish system judging may be used in the junior fair division. State aid may not be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any other division.

(b) When classes in the junior fair division are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.

(c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.

(4g) When classes in the junior fair division are judged using the conference judging system, the judge shall use sub. (4) (b) and (c) to award placements in a class.

(5) If any class of exhibits at a fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class.

(6) Special educational exhibits may be established if the proposal is presented to the department before October 1 of the year preceding its proposed establishment and the exhibit is approved by the department.

(7) Within any junior fair department, a fair may establish special classes where none are specified under this subchapter. Special classes may include classes for grade and crossbred females in the beef, swine, sheep and horse departments. Premiums for special classes created under this subsection shall be equal to premiums for comparable classes established in the same department under this subchapter.

(8) The fair board may establish specific classes are age or grade level groupings within classes for each of the junior fair departments 14 to 16, 18, 20 to 29, 31, 33, and 34.

(9) Judging in the junior fair division may be done using the regular, face-to-face, conference or Danish judging system.

JUNIOR DIVISION GENERAL RULES

1. All completed Junior Division Class Entries must be received online (see instructions on pages 5 and 6) or postmarked by the third Monday in July. Send entry forms to Price County Fair Association. P.O. Box 123, Phillips, WI 54555 by Entry Deadlines. **NO ENTRY FORMS WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER THAT DATE.** See “Notice to Exhibitors” for dates and availability of entry tags.
2. This division offers the opportunity to exhibit to boys and girls in Price County in Kindergarten through one year past high school, who are regularly enrolled in a recognized youth organization. Youth in grades K-2 may not enter livestock, rabbits, poultry, or pets in the regular show. The Fair Association sponsors for youth grades 2 and under – Little Squirts, Little Shepherds, Little Whips, Little Goat Herders, Little Peeps, and Little Hoppers Shows.
3. All exhibits must be the result of the labor of the person exhibiting and of the present year’s work.
4. Exhibits in this division will be judged according to the Danish System as explained in ATCP 160.91 (4)(b) for state aid, except those exhibits designated individual conference judging face to face.
5. Members may exhibit in more advanced areas of a project they carry. They may not exhibit below their level in a project.
6. All exhibits may be entered from 3:00 P.M. to 7:00 P.M. on Wednesday, entry day of the fair, unless designated for conference judging. Large animals may be brought from 10:00 A.M – 7:00 P.M. on Wednesday.
7. The Fair Association reserves the right to interpret the above rules should questions arise.
8. Special Merit Ribbons and Plaques are given at judge’s discretion, sponsored by the Fair Association.
9. **CRITERIA FOR SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES**
 - Correct showmanship
 - Condition of the animal for showing
 - Training of animal
 - Appearance of show person
 - Ability of exhibitor to handle other member’s animals
 - Project knowledge
10. Livestock not owned by the exhibitor or their family must register as a managerial project by June 1. Contact UW-Madison Extension about registry.

SPECIAL AWARDS

Outstanding Livestock Exhibitor Awards.
Monetary Award and plaques sponsored by the Fair Association in project areas of beef, sheep, swine, dairy, horses, rabbits, poultry, and goats.

DEPARTMENT J-6 EQUINE

Guidelines for horse safety are in place. All youth should work on understanding and developing the following skills prior to coming to the fair. The 4-H Horse Council has scheduled opportunities to learn these skills. Contact the UW-Extension Office for more information.

1. Proper helmet fit and proper attire
2. How to approach a horse
3. Proper spacing between horses
4. Able to tie a quick release knot
5. Switching from halter to bridle
6. Cinching a saddle; checking cinching
7. Safe leading and turning (walk, trot & halt)
8. Mounting and dismounting
9. Correction of misbehavior (circling)
10. Emergency halt
11. Passing another horse safely
12. What constitutes an emergency and how to react?

The Fair Association may remove a horse and rider from competition if the rider is not able to control the horse or the horse poses a safety risk to others. A horse may be removed for health reasons. If a horse is not being shown in any event the horse may not be stalled at the fair. Exhibitors should pre enter all classes they have trained for. On Entry Day they will select which classes they will enter for premium and which they will enter for ribbon placing only. On Entry Day they can choose one lot from Class A (Showmanship) or B (Horsemanship) and one lot from the remaining classes (C-Pleasure, D-Halter, E-Ponies, F-Trail, G-Gymkhana, or H-Other) for premium.

1. An animal can only be entered in a total of 2 classes for premium.
 - a) A maximum of 2 animals may be entered by a single exhibitor in all classes under sub (1) (A) Light Horses, Draft Horses, Ponies.
 - b) Two exhibitors from the same family may enter the same animal for premium in only the showmanship classes under sub (1) (A) or Horsemanship Classes under sub (1) (B).
 - c) One of the 2 exhibitors from the same family may also enter the animal for premium in either the pleasure classes under sub (1) (C) Pleasure Class,

or (D) Halter Class, or (E) Ponies Class, (F) Trail Class, or (G) Gymkhana Class, or (H) Other Equine Exhibits.

d) If you enter Walk Trot, rider or horse combination, you cannot enter any other cantering classes (Horsemanship and Pleasure classes).

2. Draft horses may be entered in showmanship.
3. Use of SEI approved riding helmets, securely fastened, and proper attire, including hard soled shoes, must be worn whenever riding or driving.
